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ORANGE COUNTY YOUTH STRING ENSEMBLE PROGRAM NOTES

GRIEG: PRELUDE FROM THE HOLBERG SUITE

Edvard Grieg's *Holberg Suite*, Op. 40 was composed in 1884 to celebrate the bicentenary of the birth of noted Norwegian playwright and satirist Ludwig Holberg. Composed in the Baroque dance-suite style of Holberg's time, *Holberg Suite* stands today as one of the earliest examples of neo-classicism in the Romantic Era.

MEYER: OF GLORIOUS PLUMAGE

Using the lush and modal harmonies associated with the Impressionistic period, *Of Glorious Plumage* paints a musical scene of birds, both at rest and in flight; however, there are no "bird calls" heard here, as is so often the case in pieces representing birds. A plaintive violin solo begins the work, introducing the theme that is then developed using a variety of effects and interesting orchestration. The second part of the piece is meant to depict glorious flocks of birds in majestic flight.

BRITTEN: SIMPLE SYMPHONY, IV. FROLICSOME FINALE

Once upon a time there was a prep-school boy. He was quite an ordinary little boy; he took his snake-belt to bed with him; he liked cricket; he adored mathematics, got on alright with history. There was one curious thing about this boy: He wrote music. So begins Benjamin Britten's own program note for his *Simple Symphony*.

English composer, Britten wrote that this piece is 'entirely based on material from works which the composer wrote between the ages of nine and twelve. The piece is dedicated to his childhood viola teacher, Audrey Alston; and the alliterative playfulness of its title and its four movements, speak to its sense of fun and good spirit. The Fourth Movement: Frolicsome Finale lives up to the expectation of its title—building gradually in intensity until a change to a slower speed suggest that we are nearing the end of the Symphony. A lightning-flash coda of fast, loud playing completes the movement.

ORANGE COUNTY YOUTH SYMPHONY PROGRAM NOTES

BEETHOVEN: CONCERTO FOR VIOLIN, CELLO AND PIANO IN C MAJOR, OP. 56, "TRIPLE"

By the turn of the 18th century, Ludwig van Beethoven had firmly established himself as one of Vienna's most prominent musicians—a virtuoso pianist and composer of the first rank. It appeared as if nothing could stand in the way of Beethoven's continued rise to greatness. But then, tragedy struck. In 1800, Beethoven, not yet thirty, began to realize that his hearing was deteriorating. Beethoven sensed that the onset of deafness was only a matter of time. Beethoven responded to his adversity by composing at a furious pace.

Beethoven began composition of his Concerto for Piano, Violin, Cello and Orchestra in late 1803, completing the work in the summer of 1804. Beethoven composed the piano part of the "Triple" Concerto for Archduke Rudolph (1788-1831), the youngest son of Emperor Leopold II. Rudolph, a longtime pupil, friend, and patron of Beethoven, was the dedicatee of such pieces as the Fourth and "Emperor" Piano Concerto, the "Archduke" Piano Trio, the Piano Sonatas Opus 90 ("Les Adieux"), 106 ("Hammerklavier"), and 111, the great choral work, the Missa solemnis, and the Grosse Fugue for string quartet.

WEBER: CONCERTINO FOR CLARINET AND ORCHESTRA IN E-FLAT MAJOR, OP. 26

Concertino, Op. 26, by Weber is one of the great works of the clarinet's repertoire. Its first performance was on April 5, 1811, and the concert was such a success that the composer was commissioned to write two more selections for the clarinet. These fine works brought an even greater fame to Weber, already a highly respected composer, and established the clarinet as a leading instrument for the expression of Romantic music. Today, this concertino remains as one of the most popular solo in the clarinetists' repertoire.

ELGAR: SELECTIONS FROM ENIGMA VARIATIONS, OP. 36

Edward Elgar composed his Variations on an Original Theme, Op. 36, popularly known as the Enigma Variations, between October 1898 and February 1899. It is an orchestral work comprising fourteen variations on an original theme. It's not the Enigma that has made Elgar's variations endure for more than a century. It's the warmth and sincerity with which he portrays real people who were important to him. Friendship, after all, is a fundamental human need, but it ranks far behind romantic love in terms of musical tributes.

Elgar stumbled on the theme on October 21, 1898, while improvising at the piano. His wife, Alice, was listening, and called out that it was a good melody. He began to vary it, imagining how his friends might write it. At first it was just a parlor trick, but then he began to wonder if it could be the framework for a real piece. Years later, he described the variations as "begun in a spirit of humor and continued in deep."

Elgar dedicated the work "to my friends pictured within," with each variation being a musical sketch of one of his circles of close acquaintances. Those portrayed include Elgar's wife Alice, his friend and publisher Augustus J. Jaeger and Elgar himself.

In a program note for a performance in 1911 Elgar wrote:

"This work, commenced in a spirit of humor & continued in deep seriousness, contains sketches of the composer's friends. It may be understood that these personages' comment or reflect on the original theme & each one attempts a solution of the Enigma, for so the theme is called. The sketches are not 'portraits' but each variation contains a distinct idea founded on some personality or perhaps on some incident known only to two people."

LEHÁR: THE MERRY WIDOW OVERTURE

The Merry Widow overture—a whistle stop tour of all the best tunes—is very popular as a standalone concert piece. However, the operetta originally had no overture—Lehar wrote one for the 400th performance. It is rarely used in productions today, as the original short introduction is preferred. Lehar got a big stamp of approval from his cast—the original 1905 Hanna and Danilo (operetta stars Mizzi Günther and Louis Treumann) were both so enthusiastic about the piece that they supplemented the theatre's relatively low-budget production by paying for their own lavish costumes.

THE ORANGE COUNTY YOUTH SYMPHONY

Founded in 1970, the Orange County Youth Symphony (OCYS) is the official youth orchestra of Orange County. As an honor ensemble, OCYS requires all accepted musicians to participate in their year-round respective school string, band, or orchestral programs. Participation in OCYS reinforces school ensembles by providing additional musical opportunities to top-performing young musicians in Orange County.

With its commitment to excellence, OCYS has performed at major music conferences throughout the United States and has toured Europe and Asia to critical acclaim. In 2012, OCYS was the winner of the American Prize in Orchestral Performance—Youth Orchestra Division. Deemed "the real thing" by *The Los Angeles Times*, OCYS is now led by Music Director and conductor Johannes Müller Stosch.

In the summer of 2013, OCYS toured the United Kingdom and attended the famed Proms Concerts as guests of the Royal Philharmonic Society. Representing Orange County's best young adult musicians, OCYS performances have been lauded by both critics and audiences throughout the United States, Austria, China, Germany, Hong Kong, Italy, Japan, Spain, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom, among others.

In May 2014, OCYS was presented by the Philharmonic Society of Orange County to a sold-out Renée and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall in a performance that included Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and the West Coast premiere of Mark-Anthony Turnage's "Frieze." This concert was selected by both *The Orange County Register* and *The Los Angeles Times* as top picks during the 2013-14 season and was later broadcast on *PBS SoCal*.

OCYS additionally serves to support and supplement music programs across the county. Presented in longtime partnership with the Philharmonic Society of Orange County, the annual Concerts for Fifth Grade series has impacted hundreds of thousands of students since the 1980s. OCYS recently began inviting select high school programs to jointly perform in its season finale concert, doubling the size of each ensemble and providing new platforms for access and inspiration to all students. In the past, the orchestra has jointly performed with Beckman, Tesoro, and Diamond Bar high schools.



JOHANNES MÜLLER STOSCH, MUSIC DIRECTOR/OCYS CONDUCTOR

Currently, Johannes Müller Stosch serves as Director of Orchestral Activities at the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music at California State University, Long Beach, as well as

Music Director and Conductor of Holland Symphony Orchestra in Michigan. He has also held conducting positions with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, the Brockport Symphony in New York, Tri State Players in Ohio, and served repeatedly on the conducting and coaching staff at the Opera Theatre Festival in Lucca, Italy.

Müller Stosch keeps an active guest-conducting schedule both internationally and nationally, with recent engagements

including concerts with Long Beach Symphony, Kunming Philharmonic in China, University Symphonies in Vancouver, Canada, and at the University of Oregon in Eugene. In 2009, he was a featured guest conductor with the Busan Sinfonietta in Korea in a concert that was broadcast on national TV (KBS).

An avid operatic conductor, he previously served as Music Director of the Museumsinsel-Operafestival in Berlin, Germany; has frequently guest conducted new opera productions at Cincinnati's famous College-Conservatory of Music; and worked repeatedly as visiting opera conductor at the Opera Theater at Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri. Aside from his passion for conducting, Müller Stosch has a special interest in performance practice and early music. In Germany, he worked with Hannover's L'Arco, Bremer Ratsmusik, and Concerto Brandenburg. He also frequently appears on organ and harpsichord with the Pacific Symphony. Concert tours as a soloist and collaborative artist have taken him throughout the U.S., Germany, Italy, Chile, and Japan. Müller Stosch has several commercial recordings to his credit all of which have been played on public radio.

Maestro Müller Stosch received his Doctorate of Musical Arts in Conducting from the Eastman School of Music. After winning the coveted Strader Organ Competition in Cincinnati, Ohio, he received two Master of Music degrees in organ performance and orchestral conducting from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.



CATHY OLINGER, CONDUCTOR ORANGE COUNTY YOUTH STRING ENSEMBLE

Cathy Olinger received her Bachelor of Music degree with Graduate work at California State University, Long Beach. She has taught all levels of instrumental and choral music.

As the founding Director of Instrumental Music program at Tesoro High School in the Capistrano Unified School District, she developed a comprehensive Music Department with more than 500 students enrolled. In 2015, Tesoro High School was recognized as a GRAMMY Signature School for its consistent level of excellence in all facets of its music program, making it one of only five high school programs nationwide to receive the award.

Mrs. Olinger has served as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator throughout California. She was honored to conduct the All Southern California Middle School (SCSBOA) Honor Orchestra Conductor in 1999 and 2015 and is currently serving as a Vice President on the board of directors for the Southern California School Band and Orchestra Association—one of the largest regional music organization in California.

She has been recognized as an Educator of the Year for the California League of High Schools, a recipient of the Irene Schoepfle Award for distinguished contributions in Orange County Music Education, and the Encore Award for outstanding achievement in Music Education. Most recently, she received the SCSBOA Honorary Life Membership.

Currently, Mrs. Olinger works at CSULB in the music education department as a student teacher supervisor and instructor for

instrument methods classes. From working with the finest ensembles on the west coast to one-on-one coaching in the classroom, Mrs. Olinger sets high standards for achievement and musical excellence. She is a passionate advocate of music education who provides opportunity for students to develop an appreciation of music with the skills and discipline necessary for achieving musical success throughout a lifetime of experiences.
